

The PSAT: Is it Important?

Absolutely! Every student should take the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) twice as a general rule, the first time being in October of your sophomore year. The first test serves as a “practice” test not only for the “real” SAT but also for your second PSAT test taken October of your Junior year. You should prepare for it by **STUDYING!!!**

The PSAT is co-sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). The PSAT is also known as the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST) so you may see it referred to as the PSAT/NMQST. The test consists of 3 components: Reading, Math, and Writing and Language.

For most students the sophomore sitting of the PSAT will offer the first opportunity/exercise in taking a standardized test associated with college. The PSAT that “counts” is the October sitting of the junior year. It serves several purposes:

- It enters the student into competition for the National Merit Scholarships from NMSC.
- The test score will reveal to the student which areas of study they need to focus on for the SAT.
- And, when the student checks YES to Student Search Service, they will receive information (lots of it!) from colleges.

The PSAT consists of 4 sections totaling 2 hours and 45 minutes

- Reading: 47 questions/tasks; 60 minutes
- Math: 48 questions; section with no calculator, 25 minutes; section with calculator, 45 minutes
- Writing and Language: 44 questions/tasks; 35 minutes

PSAT/NMQST test scores range from 8 to 38 for each of the 3 components (Reading, Math and Writing and Language). The total test score is referred to as the “Selection Index” and ranges from 320 to 1520. The scores will be converted from the sections score to a similar format to the actual SAT.
